Letter from the Editor

In the UK people seem to hold themselves up as a nation of animal lovers - more so than some other countries. Lucy's Law in April 2020 made unlicensed puppy farms in the UK illegal in order to improve the lives of pups and breeding mothers. We have the RSPCA, Dogs Trust and Cats Protection League to name just three multi-million pound organisations set up to protect animals.

We also have Marshall BioResources (MBR) who breed Beagle pups in sterile sheds in the heart of Cambridgeshire just to be poisoned to death at 16 weeks old in toxicology testing! Fortunately, there are some people who really do care about this and are trying to stop it. If you care that this is happening in your country, look them up.

To counter that, we have Pen Farthing who is an absolute hero who fights the system in order to save animals. Pen raised funds to fly his veterinary team and animals out of Afghanistan only to be refused access to land his chartered plane, which also had space for people escaping the new regime. He fought and finally won, achieving his mission. His animals are out of quarantine and being rehomed right now.

Just remember though, there are also heroes in Greece. Look what happened when wildfires swept the country. Local people pulled together to help each other and animals. Vets offered their services for free. Animal welfare volunteers worked tirelessly to try to help and protect all animals from the fires. These are the people that Greek Animal Rescue work with and fund with your continued support. These are the heroes, read about them in this issue. Ordinary people doing extraordinary things for animals. Rachel, John, Vasia, Caterina, Michele, Suzanne, Marketa, Orsalia, The Ghosts team, Spyros, Linda, Nancy and all our Fantastic Fundraisers.

Hello, my name is John Lazarides and I would like to tell you about Zesti Agkalia (which means Warm Hug) and the work we do helping stray dogs in the Thessaloniki region of Greece.

For those not familiar with the area, Thessaloniki is the second largest city in Greece, located on the beautiful Thermaic Gulf of the Aegean Sea, and it is a major economic, commercial and cultural city.

I am a 42 year old local res-

ident, working in military

personnel in the military

hospital. A keen dog-lov-

er, about five years ago I

decided to rent a field for

my own four dogs so that I

could let them off the leash

to run around more, and

not always be restricted to

lead walks. It worked like a

dream with energetic runs

in the field, followed by go-

ing home nicely exhaust-

ed, just as I had hoped.

One day, on our way to the field, I saw an injured dog by the side of the road and of course stopped to help it. I realised that no one else would stop, not even to assist me, and thus began our adventure!

I took photos, I called charities different but no one could (or

would) help. In the end I had to call the police to come and help me catch the dog, and eventually he was safely transferred to the vet. His treatment came to €300 and it took two months for him to fully recover. That really was the beginning of our team effort and all we could see around us were more helpless stray street dogs in dire need of care.

We became an official charity this year and I currently have 88 dogs in the two shelters I have established. Of those 88, four are blind and disabled dogs, seven have Leishmaniasis and nine have Dirofilaria (a parasitic roundworm). We manage approximately 200+ neuterings per year, through local municipality programmes and donations.



We have had about 100 dogs adopted through the charity, after suitably strict checks of the adopters and thorough health examinations and vac cinations for the dogs. Most of these adoptions are within Greece but some are abroad, when stringent checks can be carried out locally.




Our main aim is to create a centre for dog rehabilitation for injured dogs, where people from all over Greece can contact us for help and advice.

All expenses incurred are covered by me and my partner's income, supplemented by our wonderful friends who follow and support us, and we are proud to say we have 16,000 followers on Facebook.

We have dedicated our lives to helping dogs in need and our ultimate dream is for the specialist centre to be up and running so

we can proactively help more. Our love for dogs is unconditional and this remains our driving force.

Hello, our names are Vasia and Caterina, and we are both 20 year old students at the Panteion University in Athens.

A year ago we met at an animal-related event on campus - we immediately clicked and thus began our journey together to improve the welfare of the cats in our area.



To date we take care of three colonies of cats, with about 20 cats in each. We feed them, take care of their medical needs including anti-parasite treatment and neutering. In winter we build them makeshift houses from cardboard boxes and plastic bags. When needs be, we foster them and try our best to find their forev-



as much as we do. Over the last year, we have also personally funded the neutering of at least 15 cats, which may not sound like a vast amount but for us, it is a huge achievement.

Sometimes however, as we are sure you can imagine, our income simply does not go far enough for the never-ending needs of our strays. So we have come up with a few fund-raising ideas to supplement our income, including creating an instagram account called "@thrift_tails" where we sell second-hand clothes and we are hoping to further boost our listings with handmade candles and soft toys.

To keep expanding our options and efforts, Caterina is planning on taking sewing classes so she can create her own cat

tovs and blankets to sell at local fairs and on the internet. And Vasia has already enrolled in a private course to become a veterinarv assistant, to further and fully understand the physiology and medical needs of the strays.



Who knows how successful we will be in all these endeavours but we know for sure that we have to try as hard as possible to raise more money to maintain and expand our care pro-

We are well aware that Greece has its rightful reputation as a wonderful holiday destination with magical scenery, sunny days and great hospitality. But, for the stray animals who live there all year round, their reality is a completely different experience, and they are one of most significant problems across the country. According to studies, this is due to a lack of social care from the government, meaning a lack of shelters, feeding, medical care, neutering and adoption services. And it is at this point that volunteers like us who step in as they can no longer bear to watch the endless struggle endured by these poor an imals; they take matters into their own hands and in doing so, create a job for life for themselves in helping these strays meet their most basic needs.

We are so incredibly grateful to GAR and appreciative of their generous donation which will enable us to neuter at least 40 more females, and of course this money is ultimately only possible because of kind people like you, the GAR supporters!



We are the animals' best advocates and voices here on the ground and our consacrifices will probably never end!





Hello from me, Halkida Shelter and **Desperate Greekies.** The Halkida Shelter is not far from the road bridge that connects Evia Island to mainland Greece, about 30 miles north of Athens. The island was in the international news this year as it was badly hit by the wildfires that raged across Greece

Desperate Greekies have constantly strived to turn the shelter around since late 2008, it was a truly appalling situation there. We continue our much needed work, but shelter life is a tough life! We fully support \ all arrivals as best we can including vet care and sterilising.

I was so glad to be able to start visiting the shelter again and my recent visit in September proved to be a daily 12 hour whirlwind for two weeks.



Seeing the long stayers again and assessing the newcomers, they were all so pleased for some company with hope in heir eyes.

Checking the dogs over, many visits to the vets, dog haircuts, cutting long nails, treating wounds, giving treats, cuddles, hosepipe showers, walking, cleaning, feeding, checking all dogs have kennels with winter coming, even cleaning out the drains, cutting bushes and organising the cutting down of two huge, dangerous, dead pine trees before they fall down and kill the dogs below, were on the list.

Three hunting puppies were very lucky when I took them from a pet shop window display case. They now have a bright future and, a tiny three kilo dog chained for all 14 years of its life, is now very happy and sleeping on my bed.



male dog, was dumped at the shelter one morning. He was found badly injured on a motorway a month before and he had undergone an unsuccessful surgery at a vets, I took one look at his surgery wound and rushed him to the vet I use who on examination needed to do further surgery immediately and deal with the huge infection she found.

One of the most important aspects of our work is sterilis-

ing as it is the key to preventing so much suffering. Imagine the extreme heat or the biting cold, wind and rain. then add the tragic heartbreaking sights of sick, dying and abanpuppies doned literally dumped in the middle of nowhere, on the side of roads, in



garbage bins or mothers with no food or shelter battling to protect their babies from the elements and dangers in a very cruel world with no chance of help. Can you also imagine the fights and injuries that happen between the males competing over the females in season, running on the roads, following the overwhelming scent they must follow no matter what the consequences?



Then try to visualise the females being constantly harassed, bullied and jumped on by many males sustaining injuries, including internal injuries

that take place to both male and females as a frenzy often occurs when males are all trying to mate with the same female.



There are many females who encounter difficulties while giving birth. It's heartbreaking knowing they suffer in silence alone and, with no help around they die slowly and painfully, along with the puppies.



Desperate Greekies endearours to sterilise as many dogs as possible on a programme we have set up for strays at the vet clinic we use. We do get a discounted price but, as the number of sterilisations increase, unfortunately so do the costs.

One of the most amazing sights to see is a stray with a vol unteer arriving at the clinic. Dogs that are sterilised tend to fare better on the streets than unsterilised and are less likely to

be injured by other dogs, especially knowing they are unable to produce any more unwanted puppies, which is a huge relief.

This is where Greek Animal Rescue came to my rescue by helping with a sterilising grant annually which helps to keep my stray programme running. I am truly grateful for their vital help.


It goes without saying that this year has been a very strange and difficult one.



We decided that as one of us fell into the 'high risk' category, it was safer not to accept volunteers or visitors.

This has meant the two of us have had to do all the work and we have lost a lot of visitor donations leaving the charity with very little money. The equines also missed visitors as it adds interest to their day to be the 'meet and greet' teams. I have raised money by making masks, bags and other goodies but not enough to keep us going during the winter months.

Life goes on however, and we have to do the best we can. This year we said good-



towards our food costs.





Last year was very difficult for all of us. The COVID situation made things much more complicated than before. Many people lost their jobs, many people suffered. Unfortunately animals suffered as well.

My name is Marketa Mavropoulou and I am founder of association Tlapky z Korfu z.s (Paws from Corfu).

We are helping the stray animals in Corfu. Our main aim is to educate people about how to treat the animals and make a better life here for them. We also try to have as many stray animals

possible sterilised every week by our vet By doing this are helpto change situation with unwanted puppies and kittens. But we could not have done this without the help of

Greek Animal Rescue. They have helped us for the last two years. With financial support managed to sterilise 118 female dogs, 35 male dogs, 129 female cats and 22 male cats last year. Thanks to their help, we can concentrate on other important things such as veterinary checkups, blood tests etc.

Every animal in our care has a different story, every animal in our care has suffered different pain and experience. Some of them were chained with no food and water, they were just left on a chain to die. Every single story of a dog or a cat touches my heart. One is a story of Lucas.

Lucas was found in a horrific state in a village called Kavadades in North Corfu. I received a call about a dog that was lying by the side of the road and hardly moving. I went and picked him up and he was immediately taken to a vet.

He was only 7kg, small, fluffy, filthy and full of ticks and fleas. He couldn't even stand up to do his needs outside, so, for two or three weeks I had to carry







him outside. Lucas was positively tested for Leishmania. We immediately started treatment and we saw him improve day by day as he became stronger, happier

and also much prettier. Lucas's fur grew and he was taken to a groomer, and he became a beautiful and smart boy. After four months in our care he was neutered and, thanks to GAR, we found him a fantastic family. He is now happily living in the Czech Republic and enjoying every single day. He is loved and cared for which is what really matters.

Our association has space to foster up to 15 dogs and 10 cats. But we are always over our limit. We currently look after about 30 dogs and 18 cats. We provide all animals with food, water, a soft bed, love and the best care we can but also medical and veterinary care.



Last year we found ourselves at the end of our resources and found it almost impossible to feed and help so many animals. Again GAR came just in right time to help us with the food support. Thanks to their donations, were able to buy dry and wet food for at least one month for our cats and dogs. Their help always comes at the right time.

Because we want to offer the best care for our strays, we arrange for every single animal over six months old to have blood tests. Many animals here suffer from Mediterranean diseases so we need to keep them on medication. It is important that every animal has to be protected against internal and external parasites. We use deworming pills and spot-ons, however these are very expensive. I asked GAR if they could help us with this and help came immediately. We are so grateful for it.

I have a big wish for the future, but I know that is not possible. I wish the world I live in could be without stray animals. I wish every animal could have a loving home and never suffer or be abused. Until my dream comes true, I want to say a big thank you to my family, my friends, my team and especially GAR for help ing the animals. Everyone helps in their own way and every way is so needed and so appreciated.

My name is Orsalia Xatzi, I live in Filiatra which is part of the municipality of Trifylia, situated in the region of Messinia, , and sadly one of the worst places in Greece regarding animal abuse, exploitation, abandonment, poisoning and indifference.

While coping with the suffering of other living beings every day, it gives me such pain and makes me annoyed knowing there are so many people who harm animals or ignore their suffering.

There are at least 100 stray dogs living in Filiatra and many

more living in the surrounding villages and rural farms. The reason there are so many is not only the constant abandonment of puppies but also adult dogs - often from other areas. The puppies are mainly crossbreeds, Shepherd or hound dogs. The majority of owners don't neuter their dogs, and many kill the puppies when they are new-born or dump them when they are one month old.

The white puppies in the pictures were given birth by a stray bitch and the brown ones were found thrown in a trash bin.

I've always been committed to saving as many dogs as possible and have dedicated my whole life to rescuing, caring for, spaying, neutering and finding them forever loving homes.

I have a shelter which I built gradually over time with my own money so I can save as many souls as I possibly can. I currently look after 60 dogs along with many puppies. All are well protected in my place. I also take care of the stray dogs that I have sterilised by feeding them and helping them with medical aid when they need it. In addition to caring for all these animals I am the only person in my town to spay, neuter and cherish every dog in need of help. Unfortunately, no matter how hard I try there are still a lot of emergencies due to the fact that there are a lot of humans with no conscience.

The most important thing for me is sterilisation and preventing the birth of future unfortunate puppies. No neutering programme has been carried out by the municipality of Trifylia since 2019 apart from the 30 sterilisations carried out this year. I was not offered any of them.

I am therefore truly grateful to Greek Animal Rescue and their wonderful supporters who have made it possible for me to sterilise 33 female dogs, and it is with great relief that you have also agreed to fund another 40 female dogs to be spayed, preventing the birth of more puppies whose future would be certain death from diseases, accidents, abuse or poisoning. By spaying we are not only curbing the stray animal population faced with uncertain futures but also giving them a healthier and better quality of life.

I truly appreciate your thoughtful contributions, generosity and support; with the help of caring and compassionate people

like you I am able to make a difference to the lives of many vulnerable and innocent creatures.

A suburb west of Athens, Aspropyrgos is an industrialised and polluted area with many parts sparsely populated by people. Unfortunately this area has always been a dumping ground for unwanted animals.

With an estimated 3,000 abandoned dogs living there, most are unneutered, so hundreds of puppies are born every year adding to the growing population of starving, neglected, diseased, injured and desperate dogs trying to survive in nightmare conditions.



In 2012 a group of local animal activists got together to form a group called the "Ghost Dogs of Aspropyrgos". From the very beginning they have fought to feed, water and help these desperate animals. Our group has seven stable and active volunteers—who meet up when necessary during the week, and always on a Saturday, to feed the street dogs who gather in packs at regular "spots" waiting to be fed.

The suffering we see on a regular basis is distressing; here are just a couple of examples of what we deal with.

GANDALF - we were shocked to find this poor ghost of a dog lying on the ground with no strength in his legs. Dehydrated and malnourished his body was of ticks and he had no fur due



to mange. We rushed him to the Vets, and samples of his blood showed Erlichiosis & Leishmaniasis. He weighed just 26kg instead of the 40kg he should have been. Luckily



we managed to find him a foster home with an experienced volunteer who gave him good quality food, vitamins and medication. He has now gained weight, is much stronger and grown a new coat - it turns out he is a Golden Retriever! We are hoping to find him a good forever home soon.

KEVIN was found in the centre of Aspropyrgos weak, malnourished, full of wounds and barely able to walk, we didn't think he would survive. Thankfully, after living in a caring foster home and receiving treatment for leishmaniasis he is now healthy. Even better, we found a forever home for him and he is now a very happy, playful boy.






These types of cases are not unusual but our resources are limited so we have to prioritise which animals we can help and that's heartbreaking. Covid and lockdown have made it particularly difficult to raise funds, but we continue to do our best for the animals. Despite the extra difficulties faced in 2020 we still managed to carry out 110 neuterings, 60 feeding runs, provide healthcare to 50+ animals and find forever homes for 40+ dogs and cats.

We would not be able to continue all the work we do without donations and we are extremely grateful to GAR and their supporters who paid for 50 neuterings and pallets of food, which has made a real difference to the lives of many animals.

The problem of stray animals on the Greek island of Samos is certainly not a new one.

The island's vast size, large forested areas and steep mountain ranges create a unique set of problems, both for the stray animals of Samos and for the hardworking volunteers. They strive to provide them every possible chance of survival, and for all the creatures they are able to assist, be they great or small.



As a result of the island's geography there are a number of animal shelters in various locations and, over the past years, they have received a variety of assistance from Greek Animal Rescue.

The Protection of Stray Animals of Samos is a shelter founded by the dedicated volunteer Spyros Koymoylas. The shelter is located on the west side of the island near Karlovasi, with Spyros, his wife and a few dedicated help ers who look after the shelter animals and the large stray animal population across that part of the island. Although it goes

> without saying that if there is a call for help from other areas on the island, there are no boundaries in these situations and help is always given whenever it is possible.



nations and support for the shelter. The feeding and medical care of the animals is always taken extremely seriously, however, it is also quite tenuous as it is totally dependant on what

funds are available at any exact time. It only takes something to go wrong or a few large urgent veterinary bills to change everything that has been planned, and it quickly throws the shelter into a critical situation.

As if a global pandemic was not enough to contend with, just as the bitterness of winter was approaching, there was a massive earthquake on Samos, causing loss of life and a great deal of destruction to buildings. Many people had to flee their homes for safety leaving their pets and other strays that they may have been occasionally feeding behind. Some remote villages were totally abandoned. As well as the earthquake there was also a tsunami with floods causing further damage and evacuation of homes. This again resulted in animals

running away in fear or aban being Then. doned. just as things had started to calm down, the forest fires of the summer months pened.



Throughout these very difficult times Greek Animal Rescue was kindly able to help keep the shelter animals, as well as the strays Spyros feeds alive. This has only been possible because of the funds that you have either donated to GAR or helped them raise with your continued support through their



other fundraising. The large food donation that was received very soon after the earthquake was literally a life saver, it enabled Spyro and his helpers to continue to help the shelter animals and local strays they regularly feed, as well as to travel to some of the remote villages that had been abandoned due to the earthquake damage resulting in many dogs and cats left to fend for themselves. Food stations were set up and the strays slowly overcame their fear and came out of the darkness to eat, some even came over for a cuddle.

As everyone involved in animal rescue knows, the best solution to the stray population is sterilisation and, once again, Greek Animal Rescue came through to help the strays of Samos with a very kind sterilisation grant that enabled 40 dogs and 30 cats to be sterilised. This makes a huge and incredible difference to Spyro and the other shelter volunteers as it shows that they are not fighting this battle alone and forgotten. It means so much to them that people from the UK recognise the huge problem they

face every day with the stray animal popu lation that exists in Greece, and that other people also want to help them change things for the better.

My name is Linda and I am based on the north coast of East Crete

I have been caring for the street cats in the village where I live and surrounding areas for about 10 years and recently received a welcome donation from GAR to help sterilise cats.

How did it all begin? I do wonder how I ever start some days when things go wrong. I worked in Greece during the summer and one season I became ill and was unable to fly back to the UK, so I stayed that winter and have been here ever since! If I do return to the UK, it is a logistical nightmare trying to find people to do the feeding rounds. I have 12 feeding stations and, especially in the winter months, in total I could feed around 80-



100 cats each day. The location of these stations are on rocks, in fields; disused buildings, in hotels, at approved cat cafes and in bushes.

In the summer months when the tavernas and hotels are open, the numbers at feed ing stations drop, but I still go each day to make sure there are no injuries, or more importantly, no dumped kittens.


Street cats and dogs in Greece are the responsibility of the local councils and they should provide food, vaccinations, healthcare and should sterilise the animals. This mainly doesn't happen but this winter, due to Covid-19, every Council in Greece was given money to help feed the strays. Thankfully my council awarded people who feed strays which helped a lot. Every year they are awarded funds

from Central Government but we never receive any. However, as it was made public this year, the Councils had to fulfil their obliga-

Even when we had the lock down in Greece, animal

feeders were required to have an authorised paper signed by their local council to

say that we were given permission to feed 'their' strays on 'their' behalf in case we were

raised, we paid for a home- made trap and transfer cage to be made. To date, I still use both but have increased the transfer cages to four now. After looking through my log book of cats I have caught to be sterilised it is quite frightening that I have done so many - around 1,000 but this year especially, I have found that there are nursing mums with kittens around 2-3 months old, and when I collect the cat from the vet after its been sterilised, I am told that she's pregnant again. It is like a never-ending factory line for them, and young females at five months old can become pregnant. Without organisa-

tions like GAR, volunteers in Greece would be unable to accomplish what we have achieved.



who had to have a leg amputated due to a bite which had infected the leg, and little Kathy, found on rocks at the beach, with one eye very enlarged and which had to be removed. Both cats are now living on the Isle of Wight with two separate families.

Over the years, the attitude of people has changed towards what I do. I am now finding that Greek people are asking for my help to get cats sterilised. Unfortuately, there are still people who hate cats and would rather 'throw them to the mountains' as my neighbour recently told



me, and would report me to the Council because of the cats that come to my house to feed. do feel sad at times like this



me, as I know they do not like me feeding close to their hotels and other holiday outlets. I feel in these circumstances it is better to respect what they say and just go ahead when most people are still sleeping. There is one hotel in my village that actually fed four to five cats that were in their hotel during the winter. After I had them sterilised and put them back before the season started they asked me, and also asked people who know me. to remove the cats! I I told them I would not do this. I fed them all winter, and made feeding stations outside of the hotel. Now the hotelier and his family ignore me!

The people who are more than happy with me feeding the cats are our local supermarkets, particularly with the amount of money I spend every day on cat food etc. During the summer, if I am lucky, tourists give me small donations but, as with most animal welfare volunteers, food, medicine, travel documents etc. come from our own pocket. This is why we volunteers are so grateful to GAR for supporting us with funds to get cats sterilised. You, as an organisation have achieved a great deal over the years, like the volunteers in the field. Linda Jones

severe malnutrition as well as burns. She was probably a stray in the area for some time and weighed just 11kg.

We agreed to fund her treatment, get her transferred to our vet in Athens and then to our foster carers.

When she was given some food, she vomited up stones, leaves and dirt. The suffering she has

endured is heartbreaking. It's cruelly ironic, getting caught up in the wildfires was what probably saved her.

Look at her now and see what a Duchess she truly is. She just wants to be cuddled and lay on the sofa and likes to play with the other dogs too. She has some fear issues around men but otherwise she walks well on the lead, loves to hunt like crazy and her recall is improving.

Good news - she now has the opportunity to be homed in Holland, which we are currently exploring.

Among the victims who suffered terribly in the recent Greek Wildfires are the tortoises. These gentle animals can't outrun the flames, and those who survive the inferno can suffer horrific injuries from inhaling hot smoke and fumes. We are very grateful to have received this generous offer from artist, Rachel Ashby, who's created an artwork Hope After The Flames dedicated to the tortoise victims, which is available to buy

In early 2020, my husband and I realised that the void in our lives needed to be filled as we had lost two muchloved dogs, Alfie and Cherry, in 2018 which took some getting over.

Our daughter had spotted little Rocky on the Diasozo Facebook page, where he was recovering from horrific injuries after being rescued by Gianna and Ermioni in Karditsa, and she thought how he would be ideal for our lifestyle.

It's a great leap of faith to com mit to taking on a pet you have

never actually met and so Ermioni very kindly put together some photos and videos for us which helped considerably. It was heart-warming to see him trying to cope with a new lead and harness but seeing him wriggling in Ermioni's arms was the sight that really melted our hearts and sealed the deal!

Unfortunately and frustratingly, 2020 brought massive challenges for adoptions, with the

usual home checks unable to go ahead, so a virtual tour of our house and garden helped the GAR volunteers carry out their crucial checks.

We were extremely concerned about the stress and distress a flight from Greece to the UK could cause Rocky and so we were delighted to receive reassurance from GAR that he would travel overland by van, and not just any old van but a customised climate-controlled van, where the dogs are treated like pets and not cargo (thank you Thompson Pet Transport!).

As we should know by now, things don't always go according to plan, especially where animals are involved, and a pandemic certainly doesn't help much either! But, after a considerable amount of paperwork by DEFRA and a 48-hour stay for Rocky at special kennels in Surrey, we finally met him, with a GAR representative present to oversee things and take some precious photos.

It really was love at first sight and armed with some chicken treats, he leapt happily into our car and home we drove.

Whilst we loved his name, which was chosen by a kind Diasozo patron, Graham Benton, we felt we wanted a fresh start for him in his new life and so Rocky became Indie.

Indie was fairly quiet for the first 24 hours, no doubt exhausted after his long journey and new experiences, but lead walks around the garden soon showed his love of digging and running, making us all laugh so much!

Indie soon met his big sisters, our daughters Ellie and Jenny, who he immediately bonded with. Soon after, he met Jenny's

four dogs, Narla, Luna, Penny and Amber, and once his initial wariness subsided, he was haring around with the younger two. It was particularly useful to see how well he reacted with other dogs in a safe environment, and this gave us the confidence to let him approach other dogs out on walks, including our neighbour's dog who we then discovered was also a Greekie!




Indie was fully housetrained when he arrived which was a blessing, so we have just been working on his recall, which I am sure most Greekie-owners can relate to! His lack of dom-



HAPPY ENDINGS -PARIS AND GEORGIE

Georgie and Paris and their brothers and sisters were taken from their mother very early, only a couple of weeks' old to be stuffed into a bag and thrown away like rubbish.

Myra, our animal welfare contact on the island of Salamina, rescued these puppies. The barbaric conditions for animals on the island of Salamina had been reported to Myra and Greek Animal Rescue many years ago. Since then she has been dedicated to relieving the pain of some of the thousands of strays there, roaming around the fields and beaches, many of them ill and injured.



The island is only 15 minutes away from the mainland, making it an easy dumping ground for unwanted dogs. Myra sterilises many dogs there with funding help from GAR and she manages to send a few abroad for adoptions.

Myra made an urgent appeal to find a volunteer to help her take the puppiess – she would have done this herself but she already had nine tiny two week old puppies to deal with.



Maria offered to help and took them over, she bottle fed them night and day...bottle feeding is hard and not many puppies survive but Georgie and Paris did. A month later the pups had turned into what Myra describes as 'beautiful little muffins'!

Once the pups were old enough GAR offered to take them on for rehoming and they came to our holding kennels in Athens where we are able to prepare dogs suitable for homing in the UK. Paris (now called Deacon) came to the UK last year and went



to a home in Borden in Kent. Georgie also came over and went to a home in Worthing in West Sussex. Both pups were a bit of a handful but much loved and have grown to be great dogs! The two owners swapped contacts and even met up so that brothers were once again reunited! Thanks to Elaine for giving Deacon a great home and Terry for bringing Georgie into his life!
